
Origins of the Word

- Camouflet (Fr, 16th c.)
 - ❖ From *chault mouflet*, the old smoke-in-the-nose prank
 - ❖ Then, a small explosive charge to collapse tunnels
- Camoufler (Fr, 19th c.)
 - ❖ To dress up or disguise (theater; deception)
- Camouflage (Eng. 1917)
 - ❖ “The act of hiding anything from your enemy is termed ‘camouflage’.”




Origins of Camouflage

- Certainly did not begin with/by humans!
- Concept is not new, even for humans
 - ❖ Sun Tzu in *The Art of War*, 550 BC
 - “*All warfare is based on deception. When able to attack, we must seem unable; when using our forces, we must seem inactive; when we are near, we must make the enemy believe that we are far away; when we are far away, we must make him believe we are near. Hold out the bait; entice the enemy. Feign disorder and crush him.*
 - ❖ Greeks in the Trojan Horse
 - ❖ Shakespeare references (e.g., *Macbeth*)




S&P and Camouflage

- 19th century study of optics, perceptual psychology, color theory
 - ❖ Helmholtz, Goethe, Cheveul
 - ❖ Monet, Renoir, Seurat
 - ❖ Gestalt Psychology
 - Grouping, forms, foreground/background
 - “How is it that we see something?”
 - “How, then, can we prevent people from seeing things?”
 - ❖ Abbott H. Thayer: *Concealing Coloration in the Animal Kingdom* (1909)



Fundamentals


- Basic approaches to (visual) camouflage:
 1. High similarity camouflage
 - Blend with the background
 2. High difference camouflage (disruptive patterns)
 - Destroy object continuity
 - Erratic surface and edge cues
 3. Mimicry
 - Look like something else



Mimicry: Natural, and by Humans

- Plenty of examples of blending, foreground-background, disruptive patterns, and mimicry
- Mimicry
 - ❖ Look like background (essentially like other camo)
 - ❖ Look like something else that is similar
 - ❖ Look like something else entirely








Profile of a frogfish (*Antennarius* sp.) among sponges, Red Sea.

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





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

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
